OUR JULY SPEAKER

Our speaker for the July 10th meeting will be David J. Gross. At the time of this printing the details of his topic were unknown other than he will speak about "something cosmological." The following is a short version of his bio. "David Gross is the Chancellor's Chair Professor of Theoretical Physics and former Director of the Kavli Institute for Theoretical Physics at UCSB. He received his Ph.D. in 1966 at UC Berkeley and was previously Thomas Jones Professor of Mathematical Physics at Princeton University. He has been a central figure in particle physics and string theory. His discovery, with his student Frank Wilczek, of asymptotic freedom-the primary feature of non-Abelian gauge theories—led Gross and Wilczek to the formulation of Quantum Chromodynamics, the theory of the strong nuclear force. This completed the Standard Model, which details the three basic forces of particle physics--the electromagnetic force, the weak force, and the strong force. Gross was awarded the 2004 Nobel Prize in Physics, with Politzer and Wilczek, for this discovery. He has also made seminal contributions to the theory of Superstrings, a burgeoning enterprise that brings gravity into the quantum framework. His awards include the Sakurai Prize, MacArthur Prize, Dirac Medal, Oscar Klein Medal, Harvey Prize, the EPS Particle Physics Prize, the Grande Medaille d'Or

and the Nobel Prize in Physics in 2004. He holds honorary degrees from the US, Britain, France, Israel, Brazil, Belgium and China. His membership includes the US National Academy of Science, the American Academy of Arts and Sciences, the American Philosophical Society, the Indian Academy of Science and the Chinese Academy of Science."

I reviewed the Night Sky Network website that our Outreach leader Chuck McPartlin uses to track our outings and found an organization called "Ford Amateur Astronomers Club". They were going to have a general meeting and they were just 20 miles away one evening. The FAAC used to be exclusive to Ford employees, but they have opened up to the public. Their meeting took place at the Henry Ford College in a nice 60-seat auditorium where one of the members recounted his adventures with past telescopes. I did introduce myself as being from the SBAU. This was followed by a Hammond Planetarium show concerning the Summer Solstice and the paths the Sun seems to take across the sky at various times of the year. This planetarium had 48 seats like our Gladwin, but still had the old xenon bulb projector in the center. Tim Campbell, the president of the club and presenter, used a spherical mirror on one edge of the dome to fill the ceiling with fairly sharp images from his computer.
